European Express Association concerned over new road transport restrictions

BRUSSELS (1 June 2017) - The European Express Association (EEA) welcomes the Mobility Package presented

yesterday. The EEA agrees with the European Commission that there should be more simplification and

harmonisation of rules in the road haulage market, and that a patchwork of national measures should be avoided

at all costs.

The EEA particularly welcomes the proposal to harmonise road charging and improve the interoperability of toll

systems across EU Member States. The EEA fully supports the user and polluter pays principle. In the EEA's

opinion, it remains key that road charging schemes are fair, transparent, simple and non-discriminatory. It is very

positive that the Commission introduces earmarking for congestion charges in its proposal, but the EEA insists

that the principle of earmarking should apply to all road charges and that the collected revenue is integrally re-

invested in road transport.

Nevertheless, the EEA is disappointed that the Commission proposed to broaden the scope of Regulation

1071/2009 to vehicles below 3.5 tonnes. Express carriers, both integrators and a broad range of SMEs, use this

type of vehicles in cities and urban environments. Extension of the administrative burden will not only reduce

efficiency, but also increase costs for operators, especially for SMEs.

The EEA furthermore is of the opinion that the Mobility Package is a missed opportunity to complete the internal

market for road transport. Better enforcement of existing social legislation in the road transport market is needed

to ensure fair competition. However, to subject **international transport** as of three days and **cabotage** operations

as of the first day to local remuneration rules does not do justice to the principle of the free movement of services

and goods, and limits the necessary flexibility of the industry.

The EEA looks forward to a pragmatic and constructive dialogue with the European Parliament and EU Member

States, as the specifics of the Mobility Package are elaborated in the coming months.
